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

Director's Notes from Adam Bryan:

I've been wanting to direct this show for several years now, and last year when the City of St. Albans premiered their fantastic new event, Yak Fest, I knew 2019 was the year. June has become a month of celebration of our great river systems in the area, and I felt Huck Finn's adventures on the Mississippi river would just add to that celebration. This story was one of my favorites as a young boy. All the adventures Huck finds himself in, and especially the idea of setting out on a raft with nothing more than a friend and a dream, really intrigued me as a young boy. As I've aged I have realized there is much more to this story than just adventure and mischief, Huck Finn is really a coming of age story. Not only does Huck Finn discover who he really is, and the true difference between right and wrong, but historically our nation was discovering these things right around the same time as well. Mark Twain's The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn at one point was required reading in schools for just this reason. It provided the reader with a snapshot of American Society at this period in our history. Now that it has been removed from the schools, due to Twain's realistic use of language, so many young boys and girls are now deprived of this American Classic. We as a theatre organization cannot change what the public schools choose to require students to read, but we can produce theatre that helps fill the gaps and gets important stories back in front of our local audiences. This story has been adapted for the stage by many authors, and when selecting a version for the Alban to produce I think I read all of them. I knew I needed to find a version that was palatable for our young audience, who are more and more consumed by short videos and condensed information, as well as find a version that was acceptable to a more politically correct older audience as well. I think Eric Coble's version is the perfect combination of both. This play will clip along quickly, and you won't have a chance to get bored as Huck jumps from one adventure to the next. It also tackles the heavier topic of slavery in our country at the time without offending anyone, or ignoring the reality of the time period. Directing this show and bringing this story to life has truly been a joy from beginning to end. The cast and crew of this production have all worked so hard to make this show what it today. From long rehearsals to late night's painting, they have all worked tirelessly to give you a show that we are all proud of. I speak for all of us when I say "Enjoy the show, and we'll see you on the river!"
