Notes from the Director:

My friends and I used to canoe to downtown St. Albans, tie off to a convenient pier, climb the muddy bank to a very different (but much the same) Main Street; we'd jump the roofs from building to building, hang out at the Five & Dime and the Variety Stores, share a purloined pack of smokes in the narrow pathway that runs adjacent to the Alban, watch the parading bands with their majorettes in steel-heeled, tasseled boots clicking on the pavement to the sound of brass and woodwinds, borrow a book or two from the library, and maybe see a matinee to kick off the afternoon. Never did I imagine that I might actually return to this building to do something creative. Main Street is back, and it's nice to be home.

As the playwright, David Ives, said "We were making theatre for the best and purest of human reasons: for love. For the hell of it. For fun."

So why chose Venus in Fur for a directorial homecoming? For the hell of it. For fun. It would be a mistake to look too closely at this play and its production, despite the richness of dialogue and the layers of intrigue and psychology. For an hour and a half we watch two people struggling to complete something that never will be firmly fixed, and then we move on; hence the "office under construction," which, like Thomas, is usable, but far from complete. The design was motivated by this essential theme, trimmed with set dressing that suggests both a modern city office and an ancient Greek temple, towering and severe, spacious and cramped, old and new, clean and dirty, ambiguous and ambivalent.

If, in the end, the audience is a little uncertain of what's just happened that's perfectly fine. The mold can always be emptied and the piece recast for a second and third try. And this is the way we like it. This is what makes it fun.

He left West Virginia at 19 and spent the next four years serving in the United States Navy in Virginia Beach before moving to Florida, splitting time between Fort Myers and Tampa. In 2011, he returned to West Virginia, where his love of theater was reignited.

Since returning, Rob has performed in eight shows, including Arsenic and Old Lace, Much Ado About

Nothing, God of Carnage, Glass Menagerie, Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?, A Delicate Balance, Antigone, and The Nutcracker Story.

He was attracted to Venus in Fur for its naked portrayal of the human experience, which is at turns tragic, hilarious, mysterious, and endearing. Rob is a freelance copywriter who may one day write the Great American Novel. If he doesn't, he will blame it on reality TV and the metric system.



Marlette Carter (Vanda) thinks her boyfriend is sexy, but tells him she likes him for his intelligence. The proud mommy of a giant mouth with four legs and a tail, Marlette enjoys sushi, long walks and starting intergalactic wars. Cleverly masquerading as someone with an actual job in the entertainment industry, she has most recently appeared as Mary in *Detroit* with the Appalachian Artists Collective and as the Train Driver in *Wind in the Willows* at the

Alban. Favorite roles include Bertha Rochester in *Jane Eyre*, Helena in *A Midsummer Night's Dream* and The Fool in *King Lear* with CSC. Her future objective is to reveal herself as a giant, alien strawberry with telepathic powers and rule the planet, but for now is content to study humanity's obsession with social media.


